April Fools Day - Traditions Around the World...

Although not recognized as an official public holiday, April Fools Day is celebrated around the world by playing harmless practical jokes on out friends, family and neighbours. Let's take a look at some of the fun traditions of other countries on this hilarious day.

Scotland

The traditional prank here was known as "Huntigowk", meaning Hunt The Gowk, where "gowk" means "fool" A prankster would entrust a "gowk" with a letter to deliver to someone. That person would then ask the "gowk" to deliver it to someone else, who would send the "gowk" on to another, and another, and so on. When the "gowk" had

enough and finally opened the letter, it would read: "Dinne laugh, dinne smile. Send the gowk another mile."

Scandinavia

The Danes, Swedes, Finns, Icelanders and Norwegians enjoy a much larger type of prank, typically publishing fake, unbelievable stories on the front pages of their newspapers. An explanation is usually given the following day for those who were duped.

Italy/France/Belgium

In these countries and some French speaking parts of Scandinavia and Canada, the tradition is known as "April Fish" and the goal is to tape a paper fish to someone's back without them knowing. Don't get caught, though, or you will have to wear the fish yourself and be the fool.

Germany

In Germany it is tradition to send fake letters such as important invitations, disinheritance letters, fake letters of promotion or college acceptance, even admissions of crimes not committed. Prank phone calls are also popular on this day.

Greece

Here, people tell innocent lies in order to trick their victims. The person who manages to trick another is said to have a fortunate year.

April Fools Day - A History....

The origins of April Fools Day are somewhat unknown. Some people believe it is a celebration of the changing of the season, from winter to spring. Another belief is that it comes from the adoption of a new calendar.

Some ancient cultures, like the Romans, celebrated New Years around April 1st. During medieval times, most of Europe celebrated the Feast Of Annunciation on March 25th, as the beginning of a new year.

In 1582, Pope Gregory XIII, ordered a new calendar, the Gregorian calendar, to replace the Julian calendar. This put New Years Day on January 1st. France adopted the calendar that year.

Many people did not accept the new date, or didn't know about it, and continued to celebrate New Years on April 1st. Those who celebrated in January often made fun of those who didn't, sending them on "fools errands" or trying to trick them with a lie. Eventually the practice spread across Europe and April Fools Day was born!
